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Loney Nguyen Inspiration, Motivational & Outstanding story

Loney is a two-time pageant Queen with a local title of Miss Baltimore, Miss United States 2019, and national title of Miss Vietnam DC 2014. Her platforms were centered around raising awareness on foster and adopted youth concerns and mental health awareness, as well as bridging the gaps between communities to ensure the safety of children. Her work focused on the importance of mentorship in a child's life.

Background/Education

Loney Nguyen was born and raised in Maryland. As a daughter of an immigrant single mother of two who was struggling to assimilate and adjust to a new country, Loney's family was not able to end the cycle of poverty. She had a difficult childhood and was placed into foster care as a teenager.

While in foster care, Loney lived in numerous group homes in four different counties before entering an Independent Living Program and obtaining her own apartment before she was emancipated out of foster care.



She never lived in a foster home or experienced what a true nurturing family setting looked like. Her experiences in the foster care system showed her the injustices that foster vouth faced, as well as the prevalence of trauma within the population. She was able to advocate for herself throughout her time in foster care while she prepared for emancipation, and often lent an ear to other foster youth. During her time there, she was a cheerleader, a student ambassador, the Social Work Association Queen, and the proud Chapter President for the Phi Alpha Honor Society, Theta Rho Chapter.

At 17. she enrolled in the Social Work program at Coppin State University, and graduated Summa Cum Laude. Loney balanced her rigorous academic and extracurricular activities while working three jobs to maintain and create her own financial security. At 22, Loney earned her Master's degree in Social Work at the University of Maryland Baltimore, School of Social Work with concentrations in Clinical and Mental Health specializations. Additionally, she completed her field internship in forensic social work with the Baltimore City State's Attorney Office, Special Victims Unit. Loney was chosen from 1,450 students to deliver the commencement speech for her graduating class.

Professional:

As Maryland's appointed Foster Youth Ombudsman, Loney Nguyen serves as a passionate advocate for youth in foster care across 24 local jurisdictions in Maryland, including Baltimore City. Loney works tirelessly to protect the rights of youth and works to ensure accountability in treatment and service delivery.

Loney provides a platform for the voices of the children and vouth in Maryland and other cities' foster care systems to be heard. She is empowered to investigate and attempt to solve complaints about state and local agencies regarding foster care on behalf of foster children, related to their care. placement, or services. Loney discovered her passion for social work while advocating for herself and other foster youth while she was placed in foster care as a teenager. Loney has worked tirelessly to raise awareness and abolish the stigma and negative perceptions of foster youth. She obtained a Master's degree in Social Work and is a Licensed Certified Social Worker, Clinical. She began her service with the State of Maryland in 2014. She has served in two local Department of Social Services in different capacities including forensic social worker in the Child Advocacy Center, investigating allegations of sexual abuse, as a foster care social worker in the Independent Living Unit, and as an Independent Living Coordinator in the Ready By 21 unit.

As an expert in youth engagement, she understands that it takes a village to raise a child and knows the power of positive mentorship in the lives of youth.

Loney is the two-time recipient of the Maryland Association of Resources for Families and Youth, Youth Achievement Award, and has received recognition from Senator Barbara Mulkuski as the 2013 She Matters SHERO recipient. Her experiences helped her adopt the belief that every child deserves a childhood free of abuse and neglect.

Modeling:

Loney is a published model with experience in print, runway, spokesmodeling, and promotional modeling. She began her modeling career when she won a regional-wide model search judged by Darryl "DMC" Mcdaniels (from Run DMC) and Bianca Chardi from America's Next Top Model) to serve as a spokesmodel for WHALER's Creation. She has appeared on a Public Service Announcement airing on and fashion segments for Fox News and WBAL-TV.



Loney has been published in the Baltimore Times, Annapolis Times, IN Magazine, NXUP Magazine, Surreal Beauty Magazine, and two published calendars.

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
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Dear Lillie,


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
