Every Child Should be Loved and Supported

Susan Ramirez, CEO of the National Angels, said in an interview with Fox News Digital that herorganization's mission is to "change the way children, youth and families in our country experience foster care." She said: However, we believe that each person can make a difference in a child's life."

According to the National Angels, children are often displaced from their homes through neglect events. some children may become victims of physical, sexual and emotional abuse. (National Angels). National Angels CEO Susan Ramirez is based in Austin, Texas. (National Angels) National Angels is active in 21 cities and 16 states. We provide opportunities for people to interact with foster children through two major programs. One option is the Love Box program, which matches monthly visiting volunteers with foster families.

The National Angels have witnessed a "massive" change in the care system. Ramirez said the year long effort will focus on conscious giving, relationship building and mentoring. LoveBox volunteers help provide supplies such as groceries, household items, and school supplies. They may even donate their time.

Volunteers carry the National Angels Love Box. (National Angels) "This shows that this is changing the [family's] experience," she said. "We also look at

placement stability." On average, a foster child moves about seven times in her two years, making placementstability a "big factor. Apart of the healing process is when a child is taken away from home and placed in a foster home with love and compassion. The second National Angels program is called Dare to Dream, a one-on-one coaching program.

Ramirez is looking for volunteers who shares their value and compasion. Just a few hours a month can really brighten a youth broken heart. If you have a little free time reach out to see how you can help support these beautiful young people.

Let's join hands this April and take the necessary steps to raise awareness, end the cycle of child abuse, and make sure every child is protected and kept safe.


The recent national child abuse stats reveals a sobering reality, revealing an alarming number of children facing various forms of mistreatment and abuse. The grim statistic is heartbreaking, yet its necessity has illuminated the unfortunate truth of child abuse in our nation. Although this information may be difficult to digest, understanding the prevalence of child abuse is necessary to provide support and develop resources for affected children and families.



Foster Care Facts

- 1. In the United States, there are approximately 423,000 children in foster care, according to the Adoption and Foster Care Analysis and Reporting System (AFCARS) report release.
- 2. The average age of children in foster care is 8 years old, and the average length of stay in foster care is approximately 20 months.
- 3. About 50% of children in foster care reunite with their birth families, while the remainder may be adopted or placed in other types of permanent homes.
- 4. Children in foster care are more likely to have experienced abuse, neglect, or other forms of trauma than children in the general population.
- 5. Youth in foster care have higher rates of mental health issues, developmental delays, and educational difficulties than their peers.
- 6. There is a significant shortage of foster families in many parts of the country, which can lead to overcrowding in group homes and other institutional settings.
- 7. Older youth in foster care, particularly those who age out of the system without being adopted or placed in a permanent home, are at greater risk of homelessness, unemployment, and involvement in the criminal justice system.
- 8. Foster care is a complex and multifaceted system that involves collaboration between child welfare agencies, courts, foster parents, birth families, and other stakeholders to ensure the safety and well-being of children in care.
- 9. Approximately 32% of children who age out of foster care will experience homelessness at some point in their lives. In 2021, approximately 69,000 children in foster care were waiting to be adopted.
- 10. Foster parents are typically between the ages of 25 and 54, but there are also many older foster parents who provide homes for children. In the US, 60% of children in foster care are placed in non-relative foster homes, while 23% are placed with relatives.

There is a critical need for foster families, particularly for older children, siblings, and children with special needs.

How to Become a Foster Parent

Becoming a foster parent involves several steps, which may vary depending on your location. Here are some general steps to become a foster parent:

- 1. Contact your local foster care agency: The first step is to get in touch with your local foster care agency. You can find the agency in your area by searching online or contacting your state or county department of social services.
- 2. Attend an orientation session: Most agencies require prospective foster parents to attend an orientation session to learn about the foster care system, the needs of children in foster care, and the process of becoming a foster parent.
- 3. Complete the application process: After attending the orientation session, you will need to complete the application process, which includes background checks, home inspections, and training.

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A Foster Care Story

As for the greatest need in foster care, there is a critical need for foster families who are willing to care for older children, siblings, and children with special needs. These children often have a harder time finding permanent homes, and they may stay in foster care for longer periods of time.

Additionally, there is a need for families who are willing to provide short-term, respite care for children who are currently in foster care. Respite care provides a break for the child's primary foster parents and allows them to take care of personal needs or go on vacation while ensuring that the child is still in a safe and stable environment. There are many heartwarming and inspiring stories about foster care, but one of the best stories ever told is that of the "Christmas miracle" of the Bingham family.

In 2011, Utah couple Jeff and Sonia Bingham had been foster parents for several years and had taken in 24 children over the years. They had six biological children of their own, but they wanted to provide a stable and loving home for as many foster children as possible.

One year, the Binghams took in a set of four siblings who had been separated from their mother due to drug addiction. The children had been in and out of foster care for years and had never experienced

a stable home environment. The Binghams were determined to make the siblings'
Christmas a special one and created a
Christmas wonderland in their home,
complete with presents, decorations, and
festive activities.

On Christmas Day, the Binghams received a surprise visit from a woman who turned out to be the children's birth mother. She had been clean for several months and wanted to see her children. The Binghams welcomed her into their home and allowed her to spend Christmas with her children.

What happened next was truly miraculous. The birth mother was so moved by the Binghams' love and care for her children that she decided to give up her parental rights to them so that they could be adopted by the Binghams. The siblings were finally able to experience the stability and love of a permanent family, and the Binghams were able to fulfill their dream of adopting more children.

The story of the Binghams' Christmas miracle is a testament to the power of love and the impact that foster care can have on the lives of children and families.
